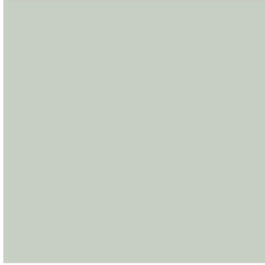

Long-Range Planning 2023

In 2023, the Stackpole-Hall Foundation launched a long-range planning study for the Elk County community. The primary goal was to engage key community leaders in identifying priority funding needs. This marks the Foundation's fourth such planning initiative, following similar studies in 1989, 2006, and 2015.

The kick-off dinner for the 2023 study was held on May 17 at the Red Fern in Kersey, with nearly 60 community representatives in attendance. These individuals came from various sectors, including health, education, environment, arts and culture, human services, and community development.

These studies have been instrumental in guiding the Foundation's grant priorities and have led to the creation of significant projects and programs. Past initiatives include the development of Leadership Elk County (now Leadership Elk and Cameron County), a wetlands classroom in Ridgway, a children's wellness program at Dickinson Center, a water monitoring program with the Elk County Conservation District, an executive director position for the Elk County Council on the Arts, pharmaceutical collections for the Elk County Recycling Center, the Community Nurses Hospice program, and several projects within the local health system.

The 2023 study mirrors the 2006 study in its focus, with six priority funding domains: education, human services, community development, arts and culture, health, and environment. The education committee is chaired by Ms. Kate Brock, executive director of the Community Education Center and active member of local non-profit boards. The human services committee is chaired by Mr. Tom Wagner, a long-time private practitioner in Elk County and board member of several non-profit organizations. The community development committee is chaired by Mr. Eric Wolfe, president of Horizon Technology, president of the Economic Development Corporation, and founding member of the Manufacturing Education and Employment Advancement (MEEA). The arts and culture committee is chaired by Ms. Jane Kahl Olson, a retired metallurgical engineer and dedicated volunteer in various local organizations, including high school theatrical performances. The health committee is chaired by Dr. Harley Ramsey, superintendent of the St. Marys Area School District and former rural health advisor for UPMC Cole. The environment committee is chaired by Mr. Bill Olson. Mr. Olson spent many years in the electronic and powdered metal industries in engineering and he currently works in the wildlife field as a consultant. Bill has worked as a technician on a number of wildlife research projects for state, federal, and university studies.

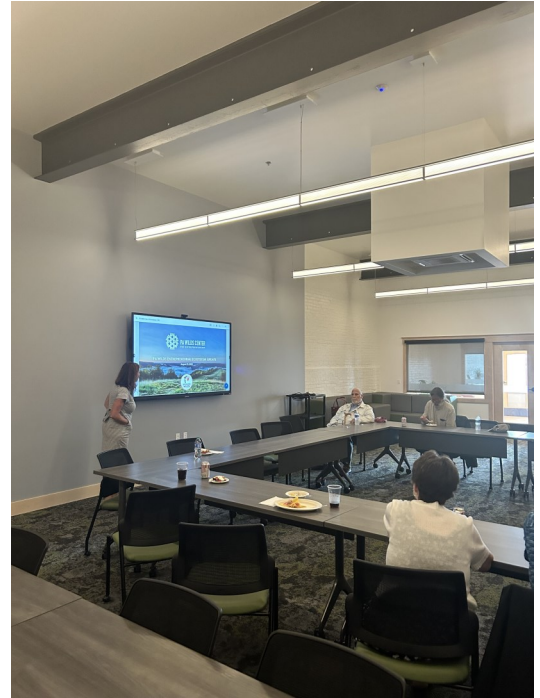

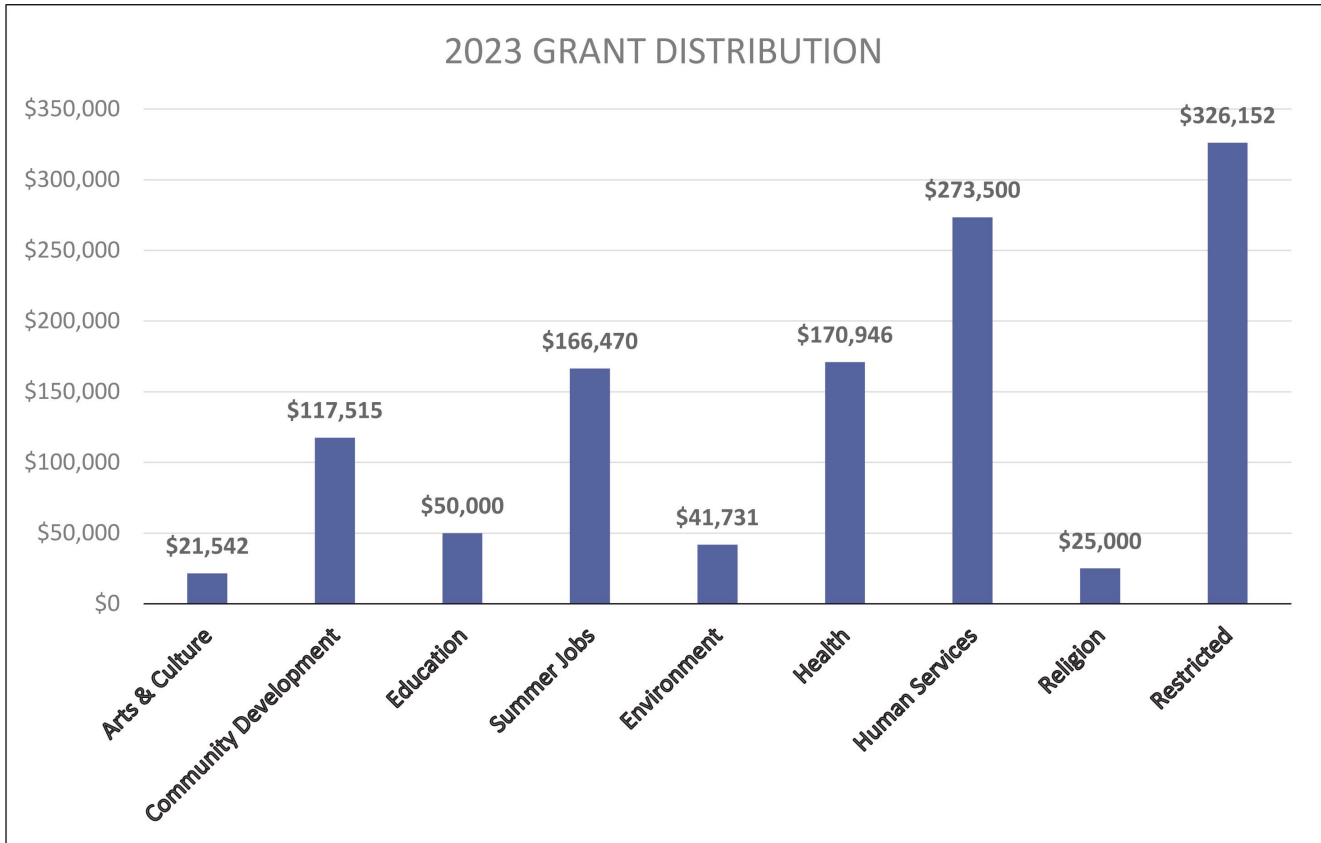

SUMMER JOBS PROGRAM - \$166,470

The Stackpole-Hall Foundation, in cooperation with the Pennsylvania Higher Education Assistance Agency (PHEAA), continued its successful Dr. William C. Conrad Summer Jobs program which began in 1985. This program allows college students from Elk County to gain work experience, ideally in their field of study, from non-profit agencies. Non-PHEAA students were eligible to apply to the program for the first time in the program's history, with employers required to hire PHEAA eligible students first. In the joint effort, the Foundation provides funding for 40% of the wages earned, the Pennsylvania State Work Study program provides funding for 50% of the PHEAA eligible students, and the employers are responsible for the remaining 10% for PHEAA students or 60% for non-PHEAA eligible students.

A total of 101 students were employed in 2023. The following is a list of the employers, number of students employed, and the Foundation's share of the wages.

RESTRICTED FUNDS

The Restricted Grants category resulted from funds designated by the bequests of Lyle G. Hall, Sr. and J. Hall Stackpole. The distribution, adjusted for the proportionate share of expenses and excise taxes, is paid annually to those organizations specified by Mr. Hall and Mr. Stackpole. The following is a listing of the earmarked recipients and the grant amounts.



Lyle G. Hall, Sr.

Lyle G. Hall, Sr. was born in St. Marys, PA, in 1886 but lived most of his life in Ridgway, PA. He attended Phillips Academy, Andover, Massachusetts, and graduated in 1910 from Yale University. Mr. Hall's community involvement was an abiding part of his personality. His dedication to the boy scout movement was probably one of his most fulfilling associations, in as much as he helped organize the Bucktail Council. Mr. Hall was known as a highly educated and refined gentleman with a great sense of humor. He enthusiastically supported every worth-while project or enterprise for the benefit of the people of Elk County. Mr. Hall passed away on April 28, 1958.

James Hall Stackpole was born in Ridgway, Pennsylvania, but lived most of his life in St. Marys. He graduated from Hotchkiss Preparatory School in 1920 and graduated from Yale University in 1924. After completing his formal education, he returned to Elk County taking permanent employment at the Stackpole Carbon Company and elected Chairman of the Board, a position he held until he passed away on August 21, 1964. When he passed, the local newspaper described him as one noted for his willingness to extend a helping hand and financial assistance to an untold number of people who appealed to him, and that his life was filled with acts of kindness that have endeared him to the hearts of many.

Independent Auditor's Report

Report on the Audit of the Financial Statements

Opinion

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of The Stackpole-Hall Foundation (Foundation), which comprise the statements of financial position as of December 31, 2023 and 2022, and the related statements of activities, and cash flows for the years then ended, and the related notes to financial statements.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Foundation as of December 31, 2023 and 2022, and the changes in its net assets and its cash flows for the years then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of the Foundation and to meet our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audits. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Foundation's ability to continue as a going concern within one year after the date that the financial statements are available to be issued.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

In performing an audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, we:

- Exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit.
- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, and design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks. Such procedures include examining, on a test basis, evidence regarding the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Foundation's internal control. Accordingly, no such opinion is expressed.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluate the overall presentation of the financial statements.
- Conclude whether, in our judgment, there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Foundation's ability to continue as a going concern for a reasonable period of time.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control related matters that we identified during the audit.

Supplementary Information

Our audits were conducted for the purpose of forming an opinion on the financial statements as a whole. The supplementary information listed in the table of contents is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the financial statements. Such information is the

responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the supplementary information is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the financial statements as a whole.

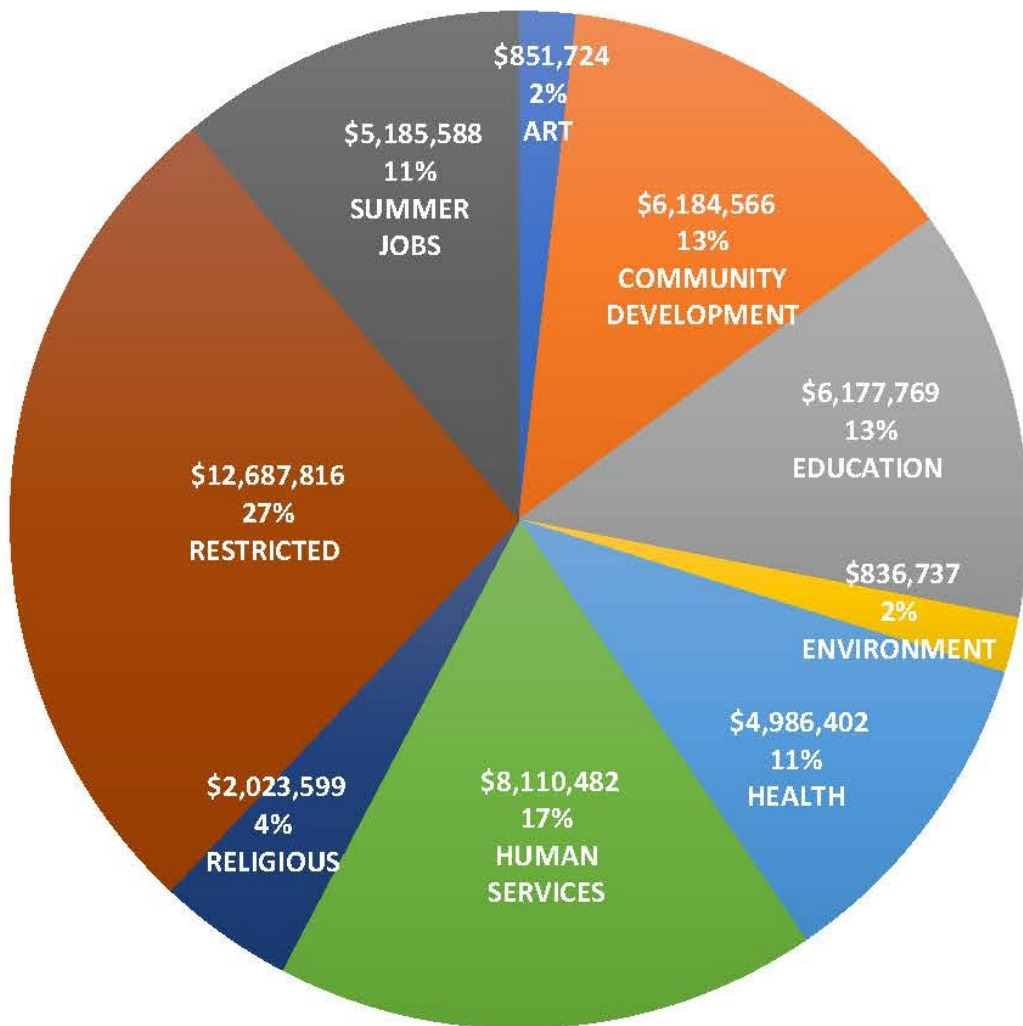

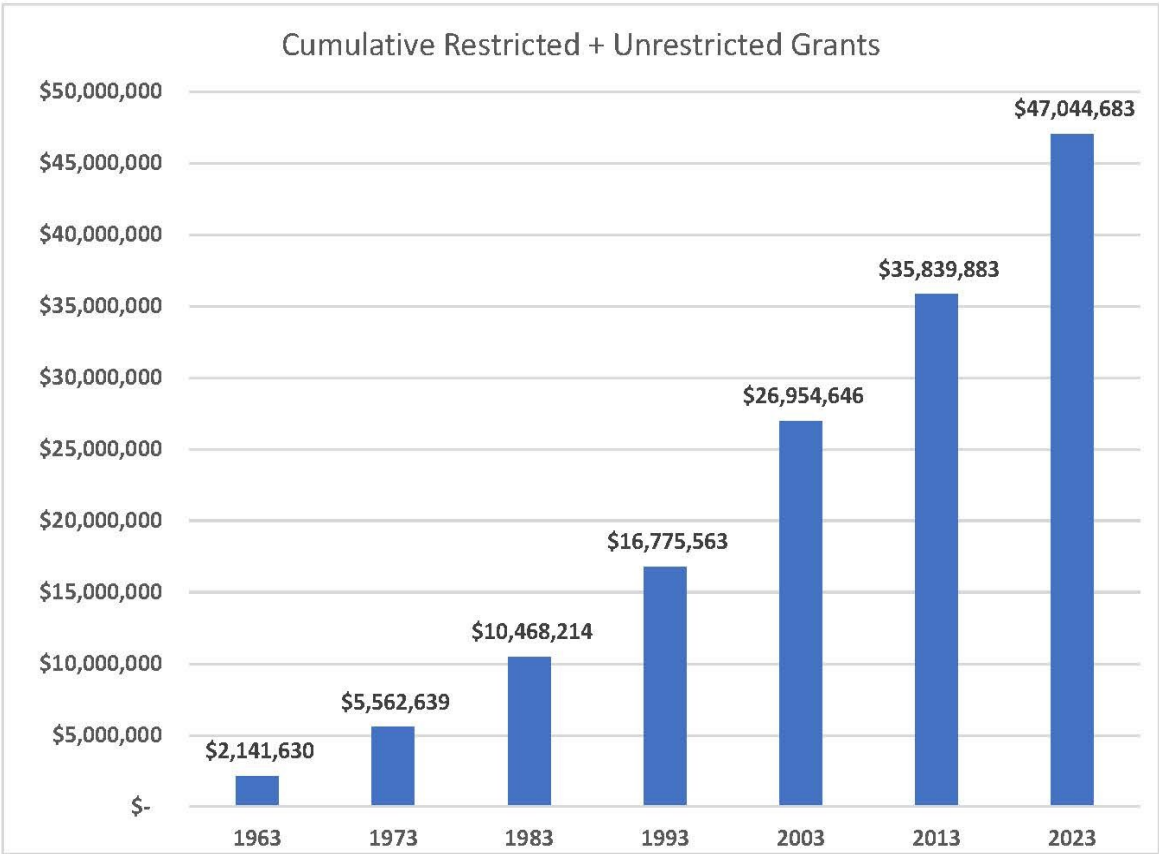
